

5 MAGNIFICENT GARDENS OPEN ON THE PLANT FAIR WEEKEND



Bangala

A plant collectors garden surrounding a restored 1930's residence abounds with many treasures. The current owners bought the house in its 1 acre setting in 2007 and undertook extensive restoration. The work was recognized with a heritage award from the Shire Council in 2011. Having completed the work on the house, work was started on the garden. Apart from a few established trees, such as maples at the rear and Pin oak and Macrocarpa in the front, the garden is relatively young but now looks surprisingly established.

The owner's aim was always to develop a garden that suited the Arts and Crafts character of the house. The garden abounds with rare and unusual perennials and an extensive collection of hydrangeas.



Wirreanda

An extensive and detailed 2 acre town garden set around a 1960's house with rural views. The front garden comprises a number of mature exotic trees from the original '68 plantings along with a range of eucalypts. The current owners have used these "bones" to flesh out the garden with an extensive planting of shrubs, new trees and perennials, adding dry stone walls and stone edges. The gentle curves of the garden juxtaposed against the rectangular lines of the house. The rear garden a mix of exotics planted around many of the original eucalypts and other indigenous trees.



Timbarra

This town garden is the culmination of 40 years of earnest gardening dedication and plant collecting.

The house, driveway and early garden beds were planned around the existing large Eucalyptus radiata trees. Deciduous trees for autumn and spring colour were added, as were evergreen shrubs. The design was informal with specimen trees planted around the circular driveway and a courtyard behind the house.

The house and garden have been substantially renovated over the last 10 years, with the removal of several large eucalypts creating the opportunity for a redesign of the rear space making formal and informal areas. The land has been terraced with hedges separating the various garden rooms adding different areas of interest in every area. A truly delightful garden.



Gowan Brae

A large town garden famous for its roses and perennials. The Cants have created a classic English-style plant lovers' garden. Skilful plantings of harmonious colours and rich textures have created mixed borders that surround a croquet lawn, drifting apparently effortlessly from one colour theme to another.

Towards the back of the property is the woodland garden, which features mature eucalypts underplanted with European woodland species, ferns and Australian natives. The shade of the woodland garden provides a contrast to the light-filled borders and lawns. The removal of a large row of pines several years ago created new opportunities along the eastern boundary which blends effortlessly into the overall garden scheme. The garden has been masterfully planted so that even the most tricky cold and moisture-loving species flourish in the harsh Australian conditions.



Rotherwood

An outstanding 20 acre rural garden surrounding an 1880's homestead renovated 12 years ago. This grand country house (circa 1890) was built by Christopher Bennett, Sydney newspaper proprietor. When the current owner and his late wife bought the property in 2004, Howard Tanner was commissioned to bring his expertise to the redesign. The house set on 100-acres of prime grazing land at Sutton Forest has 5 acres of gardens and lawns with magnificent old specimen trees.

The brick gate lodge is the only building visible from the road—a striking building with its slate roof and Tudor-style battens. One of the new additions to the garden is the walled vegetable garden with a central fountain and 12 garden beds. At the corner of this walled area is a completely restored glasshouse with the original metal parts but 21st century glass technology on the roof.

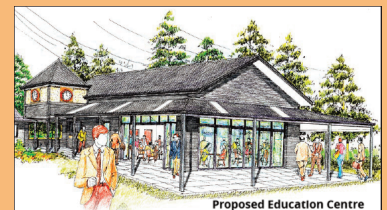
Chairman's Column

Other activities on the night will include a range of local renewable energy displays that you can talk to and the University of Wollongong's futuristic sustainable home that you can look at. There will be a kids' solar lantern making workshop, guest speakers, live music, a BBQ and bar.

Everyone is welcome to bring a picnic and enjoy the fun on the night.

Lights will go out at 7.30pm for Earth Hour and a drone will take photographs of the giant solar light display that will be attempting a world record for the largest display of solar lanterns at a single venue. Entry is free but your donation will be very welcome. It would also be helpful if you registered your intention to attend - it will help us to anticipate and cater for the numbers.

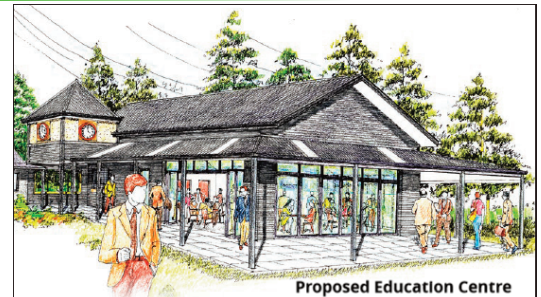
FUNDRAISER AT OLDBURY

About 150 people came to support our fundraising event at Oldbury on Sunday, 3 March. The event was held to launch a Building Fund to pay for the construction of our Education Centre, which will be located next to the existing Shed and used for a huge range of education purposes, together with community activities.

David Newby kindly offered his garden at *Oldbury* for SHBG to hold this event. He welcomed the milling crowd and gave us a short but fascinating history of *Oldbury* and its relationship with Louisa Atkinson, whose work inspired the SHBG design for the proposed Fern Garden. He also talked about the close relationship between SHBG and *The Australian School of Gardening* and how these two organisations complement each other. Charlie Albone, our loyal supporter, said a few words of praise for the Education Centre and told how his kids learn from their early experiences at gardens. Charlotte outlined the need for the Education Centre and how this would be a big boost to SHBG, especially when it is open to the community on a more regular basis. The wonderful background music of Darren Powell added another dimension to everyone's happy mood.

The weather was beautifully balmy, the setting gorgeous and the atmosphere was one of everyone having a good time. Some with drink in hand took the rare opportunity to stroll around the *Oldbury* garden. During the afternoon, people wandered to the information table and asked more about the Education Centre and the Garden itself and took away brochures and pamphlets that tell them how to support this important next step in the development of the Garden. What a great success!

A big THANKYOU to all those who volunteered to make this such a successful event. We raised over \$6,000 on the night and have kicked off the Building Fund with a number of donations already made. But the big funding has just begun and will continue until the Education Centre is fully funded. So your donation, large or small, would greatly assist.

She is good fun and we are sure you will enjoy meeting her.

It is also useful for us to learn the ways they may be able to help. We continue to live in hope.
